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CPEC as a Framework for Intraregional Integration in Eurasia



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Abstract

Intraregional connectivity has turned into a characteristic of the new political economy of Eurasia, where trade patterns, strategic orientations and development paths are reinvented. The China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC) will rightfully hold a primary place among the key projects that stimulate this change. CPEC, being a hallmark project of the greater Eurasian outreach of China, is not only a bilateral infrastructure project, but a strategic corridor that has expansive resonances concerning regional integration of both South Asia, Central Asia, the Middle East and Western China.
