Moreover, promotional materials highlighting "Samarkand: The Tourist Gate of New

Uzbekistan" will be created to further attract travellers from around the world.

Most Attractive Places

Jizzakh, located in central Uzbekistan, offers a more laid-back atmosphere compared to some other tourist hotspots. This region is characterized by beautiful




landscapes, traditional villages, and historical sites like the Sharaf Rashidov Memorial Museum, providing insight into the region's rich heritage.
